#### (d) Intercity 2004

A current member has agreed to anonymously sponsor HKD30,000 for one of the events. It was decided the Youth Team event will be sponsored by this member. Only 16 teams have registered for the event. If CSL turns down being the title sponsorship for this Intercity, NN will approach Allen Zeman for sponsorship in the region of HKD150,000.

Some invitation letters have been sent and the remaining ones will be sent by LL before July 1 to all Chinese Peoples' Political Consultative Conference members, HKSAR Government officials, Consulate General and China-backed companies referred by The Liaison Office of the Central Peoples' Government in the HKSAR to attend the Opening Ceremony, Celebrity Pairs and/or Victory Dinner, or as cash sponsors to the event. LL will circulate the invitation list later on.

(e) New Venue :-

LL and 3 qualified directors will join RHKR as Associate members to facilitate the running of tournaments at the clubhouse of RHKR in Happy Valley. Booking at RHKR for September will be confirmed after the schedule of the next horse racing season is announced.

If we find that our members cannot always fulfil their minimum snack ordering requirement of HKD300, LL will negotiate with RHKR to accept our order for HKD200 worth of snack (free to our members) every time tournament is scheduled there.

#### 4. Tournament Format 2004-2005 : -

It was decided that IMP scoring will be adopted for Terence Reese Cup which used to be awarded to winners of the Master Pairs.

It was also decided that board-a-match format will be adopted for the year round event of Woo Tsing Cup, instead of the Knock-out Team format used in the last two years.

Resolved that a maximum of 5 members is allowed in each entry for Quadruple Pairs.

Resolved that each pair has 2 chances to double their score/ranking points for IMP Pairs, Paul Jones and Continuous Pairs. The director must announce which pair(s) is exercising their so-called "trump card" for that session before tournament starts.

Resolved that ranking points for Ladder Team will depend on the number of teams present and will be counted from the bottom team upward unless the winning team scores more than the ceiling of 20 ranking point.

Audit for our accounts for the year ended June 30, 2004 has not been but will be completed before September 24. Unaudited deficit for the year was HKD76,394.32 after writing off receivable (HKD2,000)/payable (HKD2,254.40) for Director's Course accrued since 2002 and salary of HKD270 payable to Dennis for Intercity 2000. (At the request of the auditors on September 22, 2004, the deficit was reduced to HKD36,134.32 after recognition of stock of playing cards, bidding boxes and boards to the value of HKD40,260 as at the balance sheet date of June 30, 2004, thereby decreasing the expense item of bridge equipment by the same amount.)

# Report on Hong Kong Inter-city Bridge Championships 2004

This year's Inter-city was held from 10-15 August at the Hotel Miramar. The event was generally well run but local participation has been an all time low. The sponsorship situation was also poor. The pre-event preparation was inadequate and the organisation was rather chaotic.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all those who have helped, especially the operation units who created a good atmosphere for all the participants. I wish to thank the participants who made this event possible. Special thanks to our sponsors: American International Assurance Co. Ltd., Hong Kong Executive Search, Hong Kong CSL Limited, Hong Kong Tourism Board, Hotel Miramar, San Miguel Brewery Hong Kong Ltd., Star Cruises (HK) Ltd., Time Inc. Asia, Kelly Tsang and Derek Zen; and our advertisers: Christine Booth, Gilbert Chan, Koon Cheng, York Liao, Ashley Lung, Lu Qin, Macloy Ltd., Bell Tam, Samuel Wan, and Winga Garment Factory.

#### Attendance

33 teams, including 21 Open, 2 Ladies and 12 Youths, participated in the Team Championships, 3 than last year. 20 non-local teams participated, including 3 from China, 3 from Chinese Taipei, 8 from Japan and 6 combination teams from Asia. The lower attendance may be due to the closeness to the PABF Congress in July. The average standard of the participating team was similar to last year.

66 pairs took part in the Star Cruises IMP Pairs. 45 pairs played in the San Miguel "Happy Hour" Continuous Pairs, which was considerably more than last year. 42 pairs played in the Open Pairs and 42 pairs in the BWA Swiss Pairs. 24 teams participated in the Hong Kong Executive Search Swiss Team. Overall the attendance was far below expectation. The pairs events held in the evenings attracted less than normal local attendance.

#### **Financial Matters**

We have \$170K in sponsorship and advertisement this year, \$15K less than last year. Tournament receipt of \$190K was another \$15Kless than last year. Expenditure was in line with expectation. We have not yet finalised the accounts, the estimated deficit at this point is around \$122K to \$125K.

#### Venue

The location of Hotel Miramar is much better than last year. However, the problem with the air conditioning in the Open Room (Ballroom G) is unacceptable. The breakout area is ideal for the tournament. We have separated the secretariat office and tournament operations office into 2 rooms. This proves to be the correct decision.

#### **Banquets & Services**

The food at both the Welcome Luncheon and Victory Dinner was acceptable. Overall the hotel services were acceptable and the hotel staff has been cooperative.

#### **Tournament Directing & Scoring**

The directing staff of S. S. Bux (Chief Tournament Director), W. J. Tang, Ronald Hui, Abby Chiu, Eric Tang and Ben Lam did a reasonably good job in directing.

Although there were a few problems with scoring and duplication, it appeared that we have solved this problem area this year. We made use of the scoring program from Taipei and in general the scores were timely produced and posted. There are still a few "bugs" with the program, but I think we can solve this together with the operations people in Taipei for next year. Miss Doris Lo, the Chief Scorer, did a commendable job. The duplicating machines were not very reliable this year, and we were down to 1 machine at the end. We must resolve this for the coming year, both for the Inter-city and our regular tournaments.

We have followed the WBF operations format and I believe it works. The CTD is only responsible for tournament directing. The Operations Manager is responsible for the secretariat, posting of results and all perimeter work. The Chief Scorer is responsible for scoring, results, hand duplication and equipment. We should ensure that this segregation of duty is strictly adhered to in the coming year. In addition, we will need to ensure we select the more professional helpers.

#### Operations & Secretariat

The secretariat and operation office were reasonably well organised. The Operations Manager, Miss Elizabeth Yeung, did a good job in the running of the unit. Participants had high praise of the secretariat as friendly, helpful and efficient.

More secretariat staff was employed as they alternate the duplication duty. There were still a lot of ad hoc jobs generated by Council, Committee members and the Directing unit. I suggest that next year we do more preparation to prevent this from happening.

#### **Daily Bulletin**

This year we invited Paul Marston from Australia as the Daily Bulletin Editor. Nigel Rosendorff came to assist him. We provided the help of 2 production assistants and a number of recorders on request. The contents and quality of the Daily Bulletin were good and the production acceptable. I recommend that we invite Paul back next year.

Thanks to our Webmaster, W. K. Chan, the Daily Bulletins were available on our web site.

#### **Equipment**

Adequate preparations were made and don't have a problem with the equipment this year. I wish to thank Laurance Lo for a job well done. City University has again lent us the PC equipment this year. However, this may not be the case next year. I suggest that we should try to approach a computer vendor (such as Acer, JOS, IBM or HP) for sponsorship. I believe we need a network (preferably wireless) to consolidate the information from different operational units and the daily bulletin to improve our communications and efficiency.

#### Souvenir Programme & Package

The price of the souvenir programme was similar to last year's and the quality was good. Ms Flora Wong did a good job overseeing the preparations. This year's souvenir package contents were adequate and much welcomed by the participants. The polo shirts produced by Amy Yeung were of excellent quality. I hope these sponsors will support us again in future years.

#### **Prizes**

The quality of the prizes, though not as good as last year, was acceptable in view of our limited budget. I wish to thank Steve Wong for making this possible.

#### Conclusion

Despite of the lower overall attendance, I felt that this year's event was well organised and the participants were satisfied. A lot of our visitors have already indicated that they will come back next years. Tournament directing may still be a problem in the coming year, as we may not have enough of them during the daytime. I believe that we must try to maintain the friendly atmosphere and efficient operations to remain successful. This will require more hard work and commitment on the part of the Organising Committee.

Once again thanks to all those who have contributed, and all the valuable comments received.





# 四十七屆歐洲錦標賽 THE 47TH EUROPEAN CHAMPIONSHIP

二零零四年六月十九日到七月三日舉行的歐洲橋牌錦標賽,公開組有三十三隊參加,前五名為意大利、瑞典、波蘭、俄羅斯和英國。女子組有二十二隊參加,前五名為瑞典、荷蘭、法國、奧地利、以色列。長青組有八隊參加,前三名為丹麥、波蘭、法國。這裡介紹一些有趣牌例。

This was held from June 19~July 3, 2004. 33 teams took part in the Open Series, and the first 5 positions in order were: Italy, Sweden, Poland, Russia and England. In the Women's, 22 teams participated, Sweden came first, followed by Holland, France, Austria and Israel. In the Seniors', 8 countries were represented, the first 3 were Denmark, Poland and France. Some interesting hands:

Yet another piece of Sabine's art and elegance.


# 世界冠軍訪港 WOMEN'S WORLD CHAMPS' VISIT TO H.K.

今年七月下旬,世界冠軍美國女子橋牌隊在訪問中國之後,順道訪港三日,並舉行一場團體賽及一場雙人賽。我這裡主要報導團體賽情形,對壘雙方是香港男子隊對世界冠軍美國女子隊,一共打三十六副牌,分三節。結果香港隊以 99:46 大勝。仔細觀看比賽紀錄,有些牌,世界冠軍確實打得好,但有些牌卻難以相信這是世界冠軍打出的牌。不信且聽我慢慢道來,也許說,我們看四家牌,容易排出錯誤;那麼有些牌,你看到二家牌時,也會像她那樣犯錯嗎。先看打得不好的牌,最後再談值得學習的牌。

At end July this year, the reigning world champs, USA women's team, after a China visit, stayed 3 days in Hong Kong and had teams and pairs match with us. The report here dealt mainly with the teams even against our Open Team, 36 boards in 3 segments and we won 99:46!

An analysis showed that in some hands, they had indeed played well while some quite badly. It was easy to criticize seeing all 4 hands, but in some cases, the play was fairly inexplicable seeing only dummy and declarer's hands. First the bad hands, then those with lessons to learn.




The bidding was obviously too aggressive, to make,  $\clubsuit$ K,  $\clubsuit$ K must be right, trumps split 3-2 or if 4-1,  $\spadesuit$  must be no worse than 5-3. Well, like many computer hands, all these conditions did materialize, but declarer didn't get it right. After the trump lead, she played 2 more rounds ending in dummy,  $\spadesuit$ Q, K, Ace. But now due to lack of entries, there was no way avoiding loss of a  $\spadesuit$  and a  $\clubsuit$ . After the dummy came down and having 2 finesses to make at least among other things, such as playing  $\spadesuit$  from dummy to eventually force a  $\clubsuit$  lead away from East's Kingetc., every entry to dummy should be treasured. As the cards lay, the better play would be: dummy's Queen won the trump lead, unblocking 7 from hand, small  $\spadesuit$  to Jack finessing' then  $\clubsuit$ 9 to dummy's Jack and another small  $\spadesuit$  from dummy, King and now 12 tricks came to light when the 3<sup>rd</sup> trump was drawn and a successful  $\clubsuit$  finesse, 4  $\spadesuit$ s, 1  $\spadesuit$ , 2  $\clubsuit$ s and  $\clubsuit$  ruff helped by a  $\clubsuit$  discard, 4 trumps. The hands:


#### **ARTICLE ~ A Small Difference**

To many of you, the Italian pair of Bocchi/Duboin would be considered the best partnership in the world in the present days. But how well they are doing? I hope you would have an answer after seeing how they did in this board.

Not an extraordinary hand but could you and your usual partner match their defence which, in my opinion, was timed to perfection.

Boochi passed the first hurdle by leading a trump, not the DQ as some of you would choose. Forced to take his ace, Duboin returned his fourth best H5, not H10 as many others would do. You may be equally surprised by Duboin's next ducking of CJ after Bocchi contributed the C10 to show an odd number of cards in that suit, making declarer's CJ looked most likely to be a singleton. Although declarer's club loser disappeared, he was not entitled to two discards by CK & CQ should Duboin take his CA. Neither could he have two more entries to dummy to concede a club to the ace and to discard a diamond on the established CQ after a heart was led earlier on. Now you realize the importance of shifting to heart by Duboin which effectively eliminates entry to dummy to enjoy club tricks established later on.


At this stage, the declarer had no choice but to rely on even breaks either in trump, heart or diamond to make his contract. He cashed the trump king and ducked a trump to Bocchi, realising that he had three trump losers in total. The next killing move by Bocchi was the return of his fourth best D8, clearing any chance of blocking in that suit. Nothing more he could do, the declarer had to lose three tricks in diamond and the contract duly went down one.

All of us know what fourth best and reverse carding are but can we make use of those to the effect Bocchi/Duboin had demonstrated? That's the small difference a world champion pair can make.

# The Challenge Match Against Reigning Venice Cup Championship US Ladies Team

En-route to Beijing for another invitational event, the reigning world women bridge championship (Venice Cup) team from US, led by Mrs. Kathy Wei-Sender, stopped off in Hong Kong and played a 36-board match against the Ambassador Team led by Mr. Patrick Choy, Vice President of World Bridge Federation, at Hotel Miramar on July 30. In the afternoon of the following day, the US team joined the local players in Friendship Cup Pairs held at the Ladies Recreation Club after a half-day sight-seeing tour around Hong Kong in the morning.



Good bidding judgment by Roger Ling and Lawrence Lau earned 6 IMPs for the Ambassador Warned by the 1♥ response on his right, Roger did not show his second Team on Board 8. suit but led ♥Q to defeat the 3NT contract by two tricks. On the other hand, Lawrence gave second thought to 3NT after the Michaels cue bid on his left and stopped in the unbeatable 4. contract.

Board 15 Dealer: South Vul.: NS




The biggest swing might occur on Board 15 but to the favour of the Ambassador Team, it ended in a push. In the Open Room, the Ambassador Team's NS were in a hopeless 6♠ contract which duly went down one. On the other hand, Betty Ann Kennedy was expected to do much better in 6NT but the contract was failed by one trick as well.

After the ♣Q leads by East, the declarer should cash two hearts, ending in dummy. the heart suit did not break, she will be in the right hand to double finesse in spade for at least 3 tricks, hoping for some sort of squeeze if the spade suit did not break.

Knowing that she had 5 tricks in hearts, the best way to get three tricks in spade is to get back to hand via  $\bigstar K$  and plays small towards  $\bigstar Q$ . When that holds, East will be thrown-in in one of the black suits on the eleventh trick to lead into the tenace of the other black suit as he is marked with the two key cards,  $\bigstar K$  and  $\bigstar J$ .

However, the only problem for this line of play is how to read the end position precisely as East will surely bare one of his black suits in his early discards when hearts are cashed. Alternatively, what I would do after scoring ♠Q is to finesse ♠10 next. If that fails, I have to play East for holding ♣9 as well in order to squeeze him in the black suits after unblocking ♠K (Vienna Coup).

A difference in system used saw the Ambassador Team netting 7 IMPs on Board 19. The precision-styled 2♣ opening by Kathy Wei-Sender in the Open Room robbed much bidding space their side needed to exchange information before reaching the sound non-vulnerable game of 5♠. However, David Chan could open the South hand with 1♣ in the Closed Room and Anthony Ching judged well to land in 5♠.

Although the US Ladies Team did not win any of the 3 segments of the challenge match, losing 46 to 99 in IMPs to the Ambassador Team, Mrs. Janice Seamon-Molson outclassed other members of her team to win in the NS direction of the Friendship Cup Pairs, partnering Mrs. Nancy Neumann, Vice President of our Association. Incidentally, Janice's mother, Rita, and Eugene Freed, non-playing captain of this US Ladies team, were the first runners-up in the NS direction.

May we wish the US Ladies team, consisting of Kathy Wei-Sender, Betty Ann Kennedy, Janice Seamon-Molson, Tobi Sokolow, Sue Picus and Jill Levin, every success in the invitational tournament in Beijing.
