- 4ii APBF 2015: Council endorsed "AAA" team (Players: Laurance Lo, Baron Ng, Tony Lau, KF Mak, WK Lai and WK Chan) to be the representatives for China Hong Kong Open Series. Samuel Wan will be their NPC. Senior Team and Ladies Team trials are scheduled to be held on March 14 & 15 subject to the no. of registration received. Deadline for registration is March 1. Council endorsed KF to be the NPC for junior and girls, while XL will be the NPC for youngsters.
- 4iii Interport: will possibly be held on June 6 & 7 or June 13 & 14. Tentative Trial dates will be May 16 & 17.
- 4iv Sponsorships for APBF youth representatives: Council agreed to sponsor HK\$5000 for each NPC and HK\$2000 for each player in the junior, youngsters and girls team. If they won the first 3 places in their series, they will be given extra sponsorships/incentive:

Champion: extra HK\$2000 for each player 1<sup>st</sup> runner-up: extra HK\$1000 for each player 2<sup>nd</sup> runner-up: extra HK\$500 for each player

6iii Director Fee & allowance for caddies: RH proposed to review the director fee as it has been freeze for many years. Council decided that there is no valid reason to raise the fee – one of the reasons is that we also didn't raise the registration fee and membership fee for our tournament and we have no increased income for a larger expense. For caddies who help in Open League, Council agrees to increase their allowance to HK\$250 per session.

## Unlikely Mistakes

橋牌比賽的失利,是很平常的事,我這裡講的是 2015 年 3 月,北美春季大賽 Quarter Final: Monaco 對 Assael 一場。這場一共打 60 副牌,打完 45 副牌時, Monaco 隊領先 40 IMP,最後 15 副牌,輸 53IMP,結果以 13IMP之差被淘汰。輸牌一方,主要還是自己一方的錯較多。請看

Losing at bridge competitions is not uncommon. I am going to talk about the Quarter Final match of 58<sup>th</sup> Spring North America Championships 2015 between Monaco and Assael in March 2015. The match consisted of 60 boards. After 45 boards, Monaco led by 40 IMPs but Monaco lost 53 IMPs in the last 15 boards and was knocked out due to a net loss of 13 IMPs. The losing team lost due to making more mistakes. Please see below:




Trick 6:  $\checkmark$ 7, Dummy  $\checkmark$ A. This mistake should not be made. If East-West's  $\checkmark$ s are 2 - 3, you will not have problem, but this is beginners' play. Expert players will consider a distribution of 4-1, or even 5-0. Now East has 4 times  $\checkmark$ , but Dummy has only the  $\diamondsuit$ Q as an entry and so there is no way to force out

East's 4<sup>th</sup> trump. Unless East has only 3 times ♠, else the 4<sup>th</sup> ♠ has no use. Due to blockage, down 2, loss of 13 IMPs.

Though everyone may make mistakes but world-class players rarely make this type of mistakes. Perhaps there may be other unknown reasons, e.g., very tired, etc.



- A, if partner has the  $\bullet Q$ ,  $\bullet J$  or  $\bullet 10$ , you will win one less trump.

Which one will you lead? If you guess East's shape to be 5080, ♥A is best.

South had many high cards: 3 Aces and 2 Kings. On the 1<sup>st</sup> lead of the ◆A, he could only have 2 winning tricks. Therefore, HCPs and winning tricks may not be proportionate.

Monaco team lost 11 IMPs for this board. With the exception of the 1<sup>st</sup> lead of ◆, any other lead would win 9 IMPs, with the net difference of 20 IMPs. The failure to making the right lead might be due to lack of luck.



# 考慮牌型的叫牌

# Bidding with Consideration of Shape

如果你只算點叫牌,一定有很多牌低叫,這種牌例隨處可見,我這裡用 2015 NEC Cup 的牌例來說明。下面第 1-4 付牌,是進入前 8 名的第 1 場淘汰賽的牌例。

If you just count high card points (HCPs) for bidding, you would likely underbid your hands many time. These examples can be seen everywhere. I shall use some examples in the 2015 NEC Cup to illustrate. The hands from 1 to 4 below are examples selected from the first session of knock out match for the top 8 teams.

同伴在 Dbl 後的不叫,表示大牌點不多,現在 4♣,明顯是邀請,你是接受還是不接受?如果只算點,聯手不會有 28-29 點,不夠。但橋牌是講贏墩的。有贏墩的最重要一點是將牌配合,並且有牌型。你來分析一下同伴的牌,應該不會有 4 張♠,否則不該叫 4♣,他最多 2 張♥,否則應該用 3♥邀請,他的紅牌張數最多 3 張,(點少就應該有牌型) 才能邀請。這樣一算,他的牌型是 7321,你已有 10 墩牌,第 11 墩能不能在♥中產生?

實際西是國家級大師王為民,他叫的非常好,但東最後不叫。我想,東如考慮西有邀請的牌型,特別在◆套上有◆A,◆K,應該接受邀請。

Partner's silence after South's double indicates that he would not have many HCPs. Now, his bid of 4\* is obviously an invitation. Do you accept or not? If you just count HCPs, you hold 28-29 HCPs jointly, not enough. However, bridge relies on winning tricks. In order to have winning tricks, you need to have matching and shape. When you analyse your partner's cards, he would not have 4 times 4, else he would not have bid 4\*, . He has at most 2 times 4, else he should invite with 3\*, he has at most 3 red cards (if he has just a few HCPs, he should have shape) in order to invite. After the analysis, his shape should be 7321. You have already 10 winning tricks, can the 11<sup>th</sup> trick be obtained from the 4 suit?


In reality, West was National Master Wang Wei Ming. He bid very well. However, East passed. I think if East has considered West's inviting shape, in particular his own & suit with A and K, he should have accepted the invitation.



Judging from the bidding, all 4 hands have shape, i.e., void or singleton. West's bid of 5♣, though aggressive, is reasonable. Perhaps, he considered that South's double indicated 2 major suits and they would only lose up to 2 tricks for these 2 suits and his partner should have honor cards in the minors. Please see the 4 hands. With the exception of a first lead of a ♦, declarer can win 11 tirck

with other first leads. In reality, the first lead was the  $\checkmark 10$ , 5. was made, +800.

East and West jointly had 23 HCPs. Both East and West have shape and have fit in .

However, judging from available information, how can partner gain entry? She has already got the  $\checkmark$ A+ $\checkmark$ J (declare will not have the  $\checkmark$ Q+ $\checkmark$ J, else she

would have played at trick 2 the  $\checkmark 9$ ), partner cannot have the  $\bigstar K$ , else declarer will have only 9 HCPs and she will unlikely have bid  $2 \clubsuit$ . Stepping back, even if partner has the  $\bigstar Q$ , if declarer has 4 times  $\checkmark$ , 3NT will be cold.In reality, South played a  $\clubsuit$  at trick 3, declarer has the  $\bigstar K$ , and the  $\bigstar Q$  and has 9 tricks. If she has not got the  $\bigstar Q$ , she must have the  $\bigstar K + \bigstar Q$ , give  $1 \spadesuit$  to you and she will have 9 tricks. Therefore, you must assume that declarer has only 3 times  $\checkmark$ , in order for you to defeat the contract.

#### **A Testing Hand**

Picture yourself playing in the Swiss Team of the prestigious Yeh Bros Cup in Pudong. With one round to go, your team had won 5 matches and lost 2, and was lying in a respectable 6<sup>th</sup> position amidst a star-studded international field. You needed to do well in this match in order to have a chance of pocketing some prize money (only awarded to the top three teams). This would be a 10-board match.

The good news was that you had avoided the 'drop-ins' – strong teams eliminated in the knock-out phase of the main event such as Israel, Germany, England, Japan, Indonesia and USA Hampson. Instead, you were pitched against a team who labeled themselves 'Chinese Americans' – several technically competent Chinese players from North America who grace the international bridge scene from time to time.

Early in the match, you picked up this inauspicious collection as South:

- **♦** J1095
- **♥** J1093
- **♦** 3
- ♣ A953

With West dealer and both sides vulnerable, LHO opened 1♥. Partner doubled. RHO redoubled and you bid 1♠, of course. LHO rebid 2♣ and partner bounced to 4♠, promptly greeted by another double on your right, which ended the auction.

You never expected to come under the spot light, did you?

Anyway, the opening lead was a merciful ♣J.

Partner proudly put down



Judging from the earnest look on his face, he fully expected you to make the contract.
How would you play the hand?
**********************
Let's see. Your side had 20 hcps combined, leaving the remaining half pack with the opposition. It certainly looked like RHO had around 10 hcps and LHO a shapely hand for his light opening.
Because of West's failure to lead a diamond, he rated to hold 1-5-2-5 distribution, with perhaps the AQ of hearts and KJ/QJ of clubs (depending on opponents' leading methods).
Is that enough reason to cash the AK of diamonds and establish the suit?
**********************
That would be taking an unnecessary risk. What about a complete cross-ruff?
Well, that required diamonds to be 3-2 as well. Perhaps a better alternative could be found.
The best line, as suggested by my erstwhile teammates, is the following:
*********************
At trick two, play a diamond to the Ace, then ruff a diamond with ♠J. If West showed out, trumps were likely to be 2-3 and you could safely draw trumps and ruff another round of diamonds, thereby establishing the suit. Note that you could not make your contract if LHO was 1-6-1-5 or 1-5-1-6.
What happens if LHO followed to two rounds of diamonds? In that case, trumps were likely to be 4-1 (or even 5-0). Here comes the critical play –

At trick four, play a spade to the Ace and trot out the good diamonds. You don't care if LHO turned out to be 2-5-2-4 and could ruff your diamond because all you would lose were two

If you played this way, dummy could not be forced and you had enough trumps to control the

trumps and one heart.





Well...did you manage to keep your team's hope alive?

PS. The tournament was eventually won by the China Open Team, edging out Red Bull (another fundamentally Chinese team reinforced by professional Dutch players Simon de Wijs and Blake Muller) in a nail-biting affair. The final margin was 6.5 imps over 48 boards. In the playoff for third place, Poland beat pre-tournament favorites Italy convincingly, which surprised everybody.

# China Hong Kong Youngster Team Captain's Report

# 20<sup>th</sup> APBF Youth Championships 2015 2<sup>nd</sup> April – 7<sup>th</sup> April, 2015

#### **Background of the Championship**

This year's APBF Youth Championships took place in the Petpimarn Boutique Resort in Bangkok, which is that the suburb of Bangkok. It takes around 40 minutes even at a good transportation condition to travel from the Suvarnabhumi International Airport.

The venue's condition was not really well. Before we get there the hotel claimed to have free Wi-fi service, however the connection was very bad there. Fortunately a number of us bought SIM Card in Bangkok so that we can have good connections when managing line-up and looking at results.

This year is to select the Zone 6 representative for the 16<sup>th</sup> World Youth Teams Championships, which will be held in Salsomaggiore Terme in Italy from 3<sup>rd</sup> to 13<sup>th</sup> August in 2016.

#### **Training**

The team was mainly coached by Mr. David Ip, who was the coach of the youngster team in the Asia Cup held in 2014 in Jinhua. The team held regular practice and they are told to read a number of bridge books so that to enhance their bridge skills. Besides having regular practice with them, I have also joined their team to take part in the Open Team of Six tournament and reviewed every hands with them so that they have more knowledge on handling different bridge hands in a real tournament. The team is quite self-motivated on holding regular practices. They usually actively proposed dates for practices with the presence of David or (and) me. This is greatly appreciated.

#### Participants of the team

The participants in the Youngster Team must be born in or after 1995. The Hong Kong Youngster Team consists of three pairs: Sam Tseng – Niko Man; Chris Chan – Dominic Wong;

Kimmy Kam – Selina Leung. Sam is studying in The Hong Kong Baptist University, and was one of the members in the Hong Kong Youngster Team in the 2<sup>nd</sup> Asia Cup in Jinhua and also the last APBF Championship in Wuhan. Niko, Chris and Dominic are studying in The Chinese University of Hong Kong, and Niko was one of the members in the Hong Kong Girls Team in the last APBF Championship in Wuhan. Kimmy and Selina are studying in The University of Hong Kong.

Therefore, other than Sam and Niko, the other four participants are new to the field of international bridge championships.

#### Performance of the team

There were 8 teams in the Youngster Series this year. The match was in the form of double round-robin, which means each team had to play against the other teams twice, thus 14 rounds in total. 16 boards per round with WBF Continuous VP Scale.

Maybe they were not quite getting used to the field of international bridge championship, on the first day they lost all the two rounds of 1 IMP each against Chinese Taipei and Singapore (9.69 VPs). They got back the momentum on the next day and got two quite considerable wins against Japan (15.92 VPs) and China (13.28 VPs, the final champion), while a big lost (2.41 VPs) to Indonesia. At the end of the first round-robin, they played against the two Thailand teams, which were relatively weak in the field, and got two big wins of 20 VPs (against Thailand A) and 19.07 VPs (against Thailand B). The ranking after the first round-robin is as follows:

At the beginning of the second round-robin, they experienced a great loss to Indonesia and Chinese Taipei (respectively 6.96 VPs and 3.58 VPs), and dropped to rank 5. I led them away from the venue right after the match to have a good dinner, and they were told by me to relax and not to review any of the hands on that night so that they can have a better condition to carry on to the subsequent matches. In the remaining 5 rounds, they won Japan (17.03 VPs) and Thailand B (19.16 VPs), then lost to China (5.61 VPs), and finally won Singapore (11.20 VPs) and Thailand A (16.26 VPs). The ranking after the second round-robin is as follows:

Unfortunately, they finished at rank 4 with 3.12 VPs behind the third-ranked team. So they did not gain any medal in the APBF Youth Championship, as well as not getting the berth in the Youngster Series of the World Youth Teams Championships.

The final champion goes to China. Therefore China, Singapore and Chinese Taipei will represent Zone 6 in the Youngsters Series in the World Youth Teams Championships.

#### **Evaluation**

Although I have taken part in the Youngster Series a few years ago, I do not have quite an idea of the level of players in the series. To know the level of the other teams well, I frequently watched the BBO Vugraph Broadcast and also went to the Open Room of the playing area to look at the performance of the other teams in the same series. Due to the insufficient experience of the team, I did not set a very rigid goal of the team regarding its rank in the series, but just simply got above average VPs. After the first round-robin, I set the goal on getting the berth. The team has a great room of improvements on hand evaluations, especially on slam-bidding. They frequently missed some obvious slams or reaching slams with wrong trump suit, or even got some obviously over board slams. But on the other hand, in general, the team maintains a good team harmony and partnership harmony, and also listen to my advice when I evaluated and shared my experience on handling various problems encountered at the table. They are willing to learn from their former bridge players, and interested to play in the international event, and the most important point is, they are willing to learn from their mistakes. This is a good sign for the future of bridge of Hong Kong in my opinion. From the APBF Championships, we shall not only focus on improving the skills and techniques of the young players, but also their attitude towards to championship. Having high-concentration, and handling their emotions are the two important aspects that they have to learn when taking part in the international bridge events. It is not necessary for the team to be too depressed after greatly lost a match or too excited after greatly won a match. Also, sometimes they were just too cared about the mistakes made by themselves or their partners. Not only in the youngsters series, but also other youth players. I think there were too much discussion in between rounds, and the content of discussion was mainly about "why you return that card when defending the contract?"; or "why would you bid that way in that board?". Instead of doing this, the spirit of maintaining good partnerships should be always thinking of what you can do better to avoid the mistakes and what you can do better to help partner when he or she encounters a problem at the table. These are what youth players nowadays did badly in my opinion.

I would like to express my sincere thanks to the coach of the team, Mr. David Ip, who did so much to help the team to prepare for this championship. I would also like to thank all the Hong Kong bridge fans keep on cheering up the teams by whatsapp messages. Although I was very busy in the venue to check with everything, when I got these messages, they were the momentum for me and my team to do their best in taking part the championships.

I hereby wish these young players can learn from the experience of taking part in this kind of

championships and carry on with this game in their lives. Last but not the least, I would like to thank to the HKCBA Council on behalf of the team on supporting the team to take part in the championship.
