

#### Zen v Vincent Li (Open Final Set One)

So it was to be Zen (China Hong Kong) versus Vincent Li (China Hong Kong/Shangahi, China) over 48 boards for the 2015 Hong Kong Inter-City Championship.

Vincent Li picked up an IMP on Board I for a better scoring partscore, then came the first significant swing of the session:


For Vincent Li, Wenfei Wang opened 24, Precision, and Qi Shen responded 20, inquiry. Alan Sze made a natural 2NT overcall and, when Wenfei repeated her long club suit, Abby Chiu could double to show values and Sze bid his chunky diamonds, ending the auction.

Wenfei led a spade to the queen and king so Sze played ace of clubs and ruffed one, a spade to the jack and ruffed his last club. Had that passed off peacefully, he would have been well placed, taking a heart pitch on the ace of spades and losing just two tricks in each red suit. But the third club was over-ruffed and now Shen led a diamond back to Wenfei's ace and her heart switch enabled the defence to cash three of those for down one and -100.

For Zen, Karic Chiu opened at the one level and Samuel Wan made a transfer response of  $I\heartsuit$ . Weimin Wang overcalled INT and Chiu showed his long clubs then, when Yiqian Liu's  $2\heartsuit$  came around, competed with  $2\clubsuit$ . However, Weimin could in turn compete to  $3\heartsuit$  and that ended the auction

Liu won the club lead and played a heart. Chiu rose with the king and cashed the ace of diamonds then led the club king, hoping that it was partner who had the singleton club. No, Liu could ruff and play a second heart and there were just two hearts to be lost so nine tricks for +140 and 6 IMPs to Vincent Liu; 7-0.




Four Spades can be beaten via a diamond ruff, but at this vulnerability it would be a long-term losing proposition for N/S to choose to defend – to do so and find that 4 ♠ was making if partner had a slightly different hand risks a big loss compared to that suffered by taking the phantom save and, who knows, on a very good day 5♥ might even be making.

In 5% doubled, declarer does not have the entries to establish then cash the clubs, so has to play on diamonds. Either by an over-ruff or by force, he must lose the fourth round of diamonds as well as two black aces, so is one down for -100; no swing.

Wenfei opened a Precision  $I \lozenge$  then raised the  $I \heartsuit$  response to  $3 \heartsuit$  – when your basic method makes a simple raise to  $2 \heartsuit$  likely to be based on a weak no trump type, it pays to raise more aggressively with a shapely hand to let partner know about the extra playing strength, even when holding a minimum in high-card terms. Shen went on to game and Sze led the king of spades then switched to the seven of clubs for the king and ace. Chiu returned the jack of clubs. Shen won, took a heart finesse then ruffed a spade, ruffed a club, ruffed another spade, and played three rounds of diamond, ruffing with the jack. However, the fourth spade was over-ruffed and a diamond through promoted the seven of hearts into the setting trick; down one for v100.

Weimin overcalled I♠ and Liu raised to 2♠, however, this did not affect the final contract, though it did affect declarer's line of play as he knew that spades were five-three where Shen had not.

The first three tricks were as in the other room, but Wan played three rounds of diamonds, ruffing with the jack, then a low heart to the ten and king. He ruffed the spade return in dummy, ruffed a diamond high and laid down the ace of hearts. When trumps proved to be two-two, he had the rest for +620 and 12 IMPs to Zen, who led by 12-7




Wenfei opened  $I \diamondsuit$ , Precision, then rebid INT, and Shen chose to bid a simple  $2 \heartsuit$  rather than any more optimistic effort. Sze led the jack of spades. Chiu won the ace and switched to a trump so Shen won in hand to lead the jack of clubs and when Sze covered had a discard for his third spade. That meant two spades and two diamonds to be lost so +140.

Karic Chiu opened I+ and rebid INT over the transfer response and now Wan took a shot at 3NT, hoping that his long suit would run. well, it did, but not until after his opponents had taken enough tricks to defeat the contract. Liu led the ace of diamonds and received a discouraging eight from Weimin so switched to the ace of spades. This time she got an encouraging six so continued with the queen and the defence cashed out the spades for down two; –100 and 6 IMPs to Vincent Li, who were back into the lead at 13-12.

Board 8. Dealer West. None Vul.




Shen did not open the West hand so Wenfei got to open a multi in third seat and Shen responded 2♥, pass or correct. Nobody had anything to add to that. Sze led the king of spades so Shen won and led a heart to the queen and continued with ace and a third heart. Sze played a club through, won by Chiu who switched to a low diamond. Shen won the king and led a club. That lost and there was also a spade, a diamond and a heart to come so the contract was down one for −50.

Wan too passed as dealer but Weimin's  $1 \diamondsuit$  opening led to a very different auction. Wan introduced his long club suit at his second turn and, on hearing of club support, was willing to compete to  $4 \clubsuit$  over the opposing  $3 \diamondsuit$ . Liu doubled  $4 \clubsuit$ , ending the auction. Wan ducked the spade lead so Weimin switched to a trump and Liu took two of those then the ace of diamonds for one down and -100; giving 2 IMPs to Vincent Li, who led by 15-12.

Vincent Li gained another 3 IMPs on the next deal for extra undertricks in a hopeless game, and led by 18-12.

Both Easts opened  $3\lozenge - 1$  would have been tempted to open a level higher with seven-four shape and little defence to the minors, but that is just me, and nobody could claim that  $3\lozenge$  was wrong in any way.

Shen made the normal-looking 3♥ response and Sze overcalled 3♠. When that came back to Shen, the winning action would have been to show his second suit, as surely Wenfei would have raised 4♠ to game. However, Shen trusted his partner's vulnerable pre-empts sufficiently to support them with a bare king, and the heart misfit did not encourage Wenfei to go on. After a spade lead and continuation, it was a simple matter for Wenfei to ruff, cash the king of diamonds and come back to hand with a heart ruff to cash the diamond ace. The fall of the two minor-suit queens meant 12 tricks for +170.

Wan created a big swing for his side when he raised the 3♦ opening to 5♦ in the other room. Weimin could hardly not overcall 5♠, particularly as his partner now rated to be very short in diamonds, and Wan doubled happily. Dummy must have been a bit of a disappointment to Weimin as, though there was some spade support, there was no diamond shortage and the only other thing of value was the king of hearts.

Chiu led the ace of diamonds and continued with the jack for wan to ruff out dummy's queen. Wan cashed the king of clubs, getting a count signal which confirmed that the fall of the queen was genuine, then switched to ace and another heart to give his partner a ruff. That was down three for –800 and 12 IMPs to Zen. They were back on top by 24-18.

For me, the South hand has way too much playing potential for a three-level opening, so i am firmly in Liu's camp on this deal.

Over  $3\spadesuit$ , Shen overcalled 4NT, minors, and Sze showed his hearts. Not quite sure who was making what, but looking at a huge diamond fit, Wenfei bid  $6\lozenge$  and that ended the auction. Chiu led a heart so the contract was quickly one down for -50.

Wan too bid 4NT over Liu's 4♠ opening and again there was a 5♥ bid from North. Chiu bid 6♦, but did so via 5NT then a conversion to the diamond slam. I would assume that to be a weaker way of getting to 6♦ than bidding it directly, so that partner can judge better what to do (but I guess it could be that they play it the other way around, with this being the stronger sequence). Whatever the subtleties of the E/W auction, Weimin was convinced to save in 6♠ over the doomed 6♦ and Chiu doubled. there were four top losers so that was -500 and 11 IMPs to Zen. They led by 35-19.

That was the end of the action for the first segment. Board 15 saw both N/S pairs down one in a partscore while the final deal was an uninteresting game for E/W. There were two more sets to play; Zen 35 Vincent Li 19.



#### The IMP Pairs by KF Tung

A few years ago Roger Ling observed that N/S and E/W needed to be closer in strength in order to give both directions an even chance to be *the* champion when you draw your seat for the IMP Pairs. This hand came up in the 2015 championship:

Your right-hand-opponent opens 4% and you are red against green. What do you bid?

Winner, Alan Mok bid 4♠ and left-hand-opponent put in 5♡. Then partner, Samuel Choi put down 6♠ to silence everyone.



Alan ruffed the heart lead, played club king to the ace, ruffed the heart return and played queen of clubs and a third club to set up the suit. Trumps were cleared and I2 tricks resulted in +380 IMPs. THAT IS  $6 \clubsuit$  BY NORTH. Well, if you end up in 6 % played by South and a diamond is led...

This year, in 33 deals, N/S had four possible slams and E/W two. Therefore you could bet that the champion was likely to be a N/S pair. Also, the data shows that N/S has an average of 20.24 HCPs and E/W 19.76. How about that, Roger?






#### Zen v Vincent Li (Open Final Set Two)

Zen led Vincent Li by 35-19 IMPs at the end of the first session. Would they be able to build on that advantage in set two or would Vincent Li be able to catch and then overtake them?

The new session started very well for Zen.

Li made a pre-emptive raise of Weimin's overcall and that silenced everyone. Three Spades looks normal enough with such good spade support and no defence − 4♠ would be the choice of many − but the hands fit well together and this meant that a cold game had been missed; ten tricks for +170.

Alan Sze raised to only 2♠ but now Abby Chiu made a game try and he had plenty in hand to accept. Wenfei doubled 4♠, a dubious proposition given that she knew there was a degree of double fit, though much of her strength was in the opposition's potential side-suit. The double cost 3 IMPs, +590 meaning 9 IMPs to Zen instead of the 6 IMPs from an undoubled game. Zen led by 44-19.

Neither E/W pair bid to a thin game on Board 18, Zen picking up an IMP for +200 and -170, but the next board saw I IMP to Vincent Li to balance that out.


Chun redoubled then competed with 2♥ over 2♦ and that ended the auction. At the other table, Shen made the more clearcut hearts raise immediately and Wenfei showed her second suit to invite him to keep bidding in competition as much as to invite game. However, Shen was much better than he might have been and jumped to the heart game.

Both Souths led a diamond and both Norths won and switched to a heart, South winning. Weimin Wang played a second round. Chun won in dummy and led the jack of clubs to the king and ace then continued with the queen and a low club, ruffing. He had ten tricks now for +170.

Chiu switched to a spade on winning the heart. Wenfei won the ace and played the jack of diamonds to ace and ruff, drew trumps ending in dummy and took a spade pitch on the ten of diamonds before taking the club finesse. The friendly club layout meant she had the rest; I I tricks for +650 and 10 IMPs to Vincent Li, trailing 30-44.

Four Diamonds down two against 3♦ down one gave Vincent Li another 2 IMPs on the next deal to close to 32 -45. Board 22 was a flat game for N/S, but there was a swing on Board 23.


Chiu passed as dealer then competed with 2♥ when the INT opening came back around. Shen led a trump. Chiu won the ace and led a diamond to the queen, king and ace, and back came another trump. declarer won and drew the missing trumps then set about establishing a diamond. There were two more of those to lose plus a spade, but the club king was onside so there was only one loser there and the contract was just made for +110.

Weimin opened a multi and Chun passed – the standard defence in the UK is to double on this hand-type as this is the safest time to get involved in the auction when having some high cards but little playing strength. when the  $2\heartsuit$ , pass or correct, response came back to him, Chun doubled – hardly the ideal distribution, but this deal illustrates once again that, if you are not sure whether to bid or allow the auction to end, bidding rates to be the long-term winner as it gives the opposition one more decision, and they may get it wrong. sure enough,  $3\diamondsuit$  was going to go several down, vulnerable, but Li judged to take the push to  $3\heartsuit$ .

Derek Zen led the queen of diamonds and, when that held the trick, switched to a trump. Li won in hand and led a diamond, ducking Zen's ten, and back came a second trump. there was still one loser to come in each side suit from here so Li was down one for -100 and 5 IMPs to Zen, extending the lead to 50-32.

Both teams missed a huge chance for a swing on this next

Both Souths were able to set trumps at the three level and both Norths were happy to cuebid a spade control. Now Weimin blasted into a key-card ask and followed up with 5NT, promising all the key cards and inviting the grand. Li showed his side king and Weimin thought  $7^{\circ}$  as likely to make as 6NT so bid the grand.

In the other room, Chiu cuebid 4 over 3 and Sze signed off in game. Now Chiu asked for key cards and followed up with 5NT. Here, Chiu knew the king of diamonds was missing as Sze would surely have cuebid with that card, and Sze knew that his partner had that information. He had the sixth heart and spade king and if partner could look for seven after he had signed off then seven should have decent play. He bid the grand slam. Do you actually want to be in the grand on these hands? Try it on a diamond lead through the ace-queen. Assuming that you don't fancy the finesse, it isn't that great, is it? Personally, I would rather be in a small slam.


Zen led the two of hearts round to declarer's ten. Li went for clubs, playing ace then king and, when that was ruffed, he needed the diamond finesse just to get out for one down so actually made only 11 tricks for -100.

Wenfei led the two of diamonds. Sze won the ace and played king then queen of hearts before trying to ruff out the clubs. Wenfei ruffed the second club and led another diamond so the board was a push at -100.

Just a question of theory. If you bid 4NT and find that all the key cards are present, does your 5NT follow-up strongly invite a grand slam, or is it more of a courtesy bid, just to confirm to partner that no key card is missing so that he can go on to seven with a really good hand? Or does the answer, perhaps, depend on the auction to date, and whether partner has properly limited his hand earlier in the auction. That last tends to be less clear for pairs playing two-over-one game-forcing, where North on the actual deal could have quite a range of hands, particularly in the auction where South took control after the first cuebid.

The next few boards were also flat, though without quite the same excitement, then Zen picked up an overtrick IMP on Board 28; 51-32. Board 29 was flat in 3NT+2 by N/S and Zen picked up 2 more IMPs on Board 30 for an extra undertrick. Board 31 was flat in partscore but the set ended with an opportunity for an E/W pair to outbid their counterparts on a slam deal.

Shen opened an ugly off-shape 2NT, showed his hearts in response to Stayman, then accepted Wenfei's slam invite. Five Hearts was also rather ugly – partner could accept when there are two top club losers or seven could be cold, but presumably an irregular partnership was short of good methods in this situation. Still, it is hard to see how 3♠ over 3♥ could go far wrong, whether or not it clearly agreed hearts. Though hearts were four-one, spades divided favourably, as did clubs had declarer required a Plan B. Thirteen tricks meant +1460.

At least Shen's 2NT opening avoided any interference from his opponents. Not so Chun's strong club, which attracted a pre-emptive overcall from Li. That did not greatly inconvenience Zen, who had an easy 3\( \Delta \) bid, but Weimin's gentle diamond raise left Chun with an awkward problem, which he resolved by doubling when a forcing pass looks far better — as suspect he may now agree after Zen left in the double, clearly believing it to be for penalty, as would I when the aforementioned forcing pass was an option.


Zen cashed the ace and king of spades then switched to a heart. Chun won and tried a second heart but that was ruffed and Li cashed the ace of trumps then made a careless error when he left the remaining trump outstanding and played the spade jack for a heart discard. That meant Chun got a ruff with the jack of diamonds and there were two clubs to come. Down three instead of two was –500 instead of –300, but that cost just a single IMP, Vincent Li still gaining 14 on the board to close out set two trailing by just 12 IMPs at 46-58. there were 16 deals to go.



#### Zen v Vincent Li (Open Final Set Three)

At the end of five days of tough competition, we were down to 16 boards to decide the fate of the 2015 Hong Kong Inter-city Open Team Championship. Going into those final 16 deals, Zen led Vincent Li by just 12 IMPs, at 58-46. It was better to be up by 12 than behind by that number, but 12 IMPs is just one game swing, so it was still anybody's championship.


Zen added to the lead on the first board. Board I. Dealer North. None Vul.



Zen opened INT while Wenfei had to open a strong club then rebid INT to show her balanced 16 HCP.

Weimin led the two of spades to the jack and king and Zen led a heart to the jack and king. Li returned the queen of diamonds, ducked, and continued with the jack, also ducked. That brought down the ace, and Weimin tried a low club round to declarer's queen. when Zen now played a second heart, Weimin won the ace and played a second club round to the ace. Zen could cash two hearts then finesse against the ten of diamonds and had eight tricks for +120.

Samuel Wan too led the two of spades to the jack and king and Wenfei led a heart to dummy's queen. suspicious that declarer might have ace to three, Karic Chiu ducked and that worked like a charm for the defence as, seeing that she was in dummy for the one and only time, Wenfei tried a diamond to her king. That lost to the ace and Wan led another low spade to the queen and ace. Declarer exited with a diamond but there was nothing good happening there. the defnce cashed the diamonds, the spades, and the hearts, before playing a club through and the contract was three down for –300 and 9 IMPs to Zen, whose lead was up to 67-46.




Weimin opened 4% and Li competed with 5% over Chun's  $4\clubsuit$  overcall. However, when Chun went on to  $5\clubsuit$ , Li doubled. Holding a normal hand for his initial action, it was very undisciplined of Weimin to over-rule his partner and take that out to 6%.

Chun cashed the ace of clubs, looked the dummy and switched to his diamond. Weimin finessed the queen, losing to the king, and Zen misread the position, returning the queen of clubs in an attempt to give his partner a ruff. That allowed Weimin to get rid of his spade loser on the king of clubs but, after drawing trumps, he had to lose a second diamond trick so was two down for -200.

The auction began in the same fashion in the other room, but here Wenfei doubled 5%. If that was intended to shut up her partner it didn't work as Shen had exceptional extra spade length and removed to  $5\clubsuit$ . Perhaps we saw a second example of ill-discipline when that got doubled and Wenfei ran to 5NT to show the minors. she can hardly have been happy to see Shen have to run back to his own suit a level higher than before, but why should there be a minor-suit fit when partner bids  $4\clubsuit$  then  $5\spadesuit$ ?

Chiu led the ten of hearts. Wan overtook to switch to his club but Shen rose with the ace and played on trumps. He had to lose a trick in each suit so was down three for –500 and 12 IMPs to Zen. the lead was looking a little more comfortable at 77-46, but there were still plenty of boards left for a Vincent Li fightback.



When wan made a pre-emptive raise to the three level, Shen made a responsive double but, with a wasted club queen, Wenfei was unwilling to do more than bid a simple 3♦ in response and now Shen gave up. Wan led the eight of hearts to the king and ace and Wenfei played the spade queen. Chiu grabbed the ace to play back a heart, but Wenfei could win, draw trumps and cash the spades to claim 12 tricks for +170.

In the other room, Weimin's single raise didn't get the job done. It left space for Chun to first show his main suit, then the secondary heart suit over Zen's strength-showing  $3\lozenge$ . Zen raised to  $4\heartsuit$ , ending the auction. The defence began with two rounds of clubs. Chun ruffed, took a heart finesse and led the low spade to his jack and the ace. He won the diamond return and repeated the heart finesse, coming to 11 tricks for +650 and 10 IMPs to Zen, up by 88-46.

Board 5. Dealer North. N/S Vul.



Both N/S pairs bid smoothly to the small slam. Li made a natural game-forcing rebid and Weimin raised then jumped to slam, hoping that a heart lead would not prove to be too embarrassing. He need not have worried the lead was indeed a low heart, but Li put up the queen and it held the trick so he drew trumps in two rounds then led a spade to the queen and 13 tricks for +1390.

Chiu rebid an artificial 2NT then showed his second suit and wan cuebid then asked for key cards and followed up by inviting the grand slam. Chiu was not interested so signed off in 6. Here the lead was the two of clubs and Chiu ran it, losing to the king. He rose with the ace on the heart switch and played ace of spades followed by a high spade ruff and the fall of the king meant he could claim for +1370 but 1 IMP to Vincent Li; 47-88.

Board 6 was flat in 3NT+1 by E/W and Board 7 in 3NT-1 by N/S. It was still 88-47 in favour of Zen when the next potential swing deal came along.

Wenfei opened with a multi and Wan contented himself with a simple overcall. Chiu invited game and wan, of course, accepted. He made II tricks after a heart lead for +450.

Zen didn't like the heart suit so passed the East hand and Weimin opened I. When he caught a simple raise he made waht was ostensibly a game try but, when Li accepted, jumped to slam. The lead was the king of hearts and dummy's diamond holding must have been a disappointment – not that Li could have declined the game invitation when holding two aces and the spade jack.


Weimin won the ace of hearts, pitching a club from hand, led a low spade to the queen and, when the ten fell, crossed to the ace of clubs to take a second spade finesse. He only needed a three-two diamond split or singleton honour now but his luck was out. Two diamond losers meant down one for –50 and 11 IMPs to Zen. midway through the set they led by 99-47 and had one hand on the trophy.

On Board 9 the two E/W pairs both played a good grand in game. East held, vulnerable against not:

and raised to game. nothing too terrible there, but there were 14 top tricks and the board was flat at +640.



At our first table, there were three passes to Li, who opened  $I \lozenge$  then rebid INT over the  $I \heartsuit$  response and was left to play there. Zen led the five of clubs so Chun won the ace then king and switched to a low diamond. Zen put in the jack then led the nine of clubs, suit preference for spades, to clear the suit. Li won and played the king of spades so Zen won and cashed the clubs. The he played a heart through to the jack, queen and ace. Li cashed the spades and that squeezed chun down to the bare queen of diamonds to keep his heart stopper. Li cashed the heart then the diamond and was charmed to see the king and queen fall together under the ace; seven tricks and +90.

In the other room, Chiu did not get the chance to open the North hand as Shen had opened I on front of him. Here, it was E/W who had the auction to themselves and they easily reached the four-four spade fit. Wan led a heart to the ten and ace and Chou switched to the king of spades and, when that wad ducked, a second spade. Wenfei won the second spade, played a club to the ace and a diamond to her king. Next she led a heart up, Wan taking the king but there was nothing the defence could do from here and Wenfei had eight tricks for +110 and 5 IMPs to Vincent Li. They trailed by 52-99 with six boards to play. Was this the start of a last gasp comeback?

No, Zen added an overtrick IMP on Board 11 and 4 IMPs more on Board 12 for making an overtrick in 20 at one table and beating it a trick at the other., and led by 104-52.

Board 13. Dealer North. All Vul.



Wenfei's double of the Stayman response got Shen off to the killing lead of queen and another club and the contract was down one for -100.

There was no double in the other room, and that is understandable with only a four-card club suit, but it meant that Chun had no reason to lead the suit. Instead, he led the three of diamonds to dummy's queen and a discouraging nine from Zen. Weimin cashed the king of hearts then played a spade to his king followed by the jack of hearts. Chun won the queen as Zen followed for the second successive round of hearts with his smallest card. would that be sufficient to make Chun switch to a club? No, it was too vague an inference for Chun who actually returned a spade. Weimin had nine tricks now for 600 and 12 IMPs to Vincent Li; 64-104.

Both N/S pairs missed a good spade game on Board 14. As an aside, you are North and hold:

Do you not owe partner a raise? He has shown a hand too good for an initial overcall, after all? North passed and missed the game and an opportunity to gain IMPs as at the other table East opened INT and South overcalled 24, and here there was no reason to look for game.
