

Ladies Final 3 - Pertamina DKI v Sapphire

Our first look at the Ladies competition will also be our last, as we turn our attention to the last set of the final between Pertamina DKI of Indonesia and the Hong Kong/China combination, Sapphire. Going into this final 16-board set, Sapphire led by 10 IMPs, 69-59.

Pertamina picked up 2 IMPs on Board 2 for a higher-scoring partscore, then took the lead with this huge disaster for their opponents.

Juilita Tueje's weak no trump saw Ping Zhu overcall to show the majors and Yiqian Liu give preference to hearts. So peaceful and no hint of the carnage that was to ensue at the other table.


Tueje led the two of diamonds to the seven, ten and queen, and Liu led a spade to the king followed by the eight of diamonds, Lusje Bojoh winning the jack and returning a heart to the seven and ace. Liu played the nine of diamonds, ruffing out the ace, then a second spade. Tueje won the ace and returned the jack to dummy's queen but Liu simply cashed the king of hearts then played winners and Tueje could make only her two trump tricks; nine tricks for +140.

Pearlie Chan opened I♣ and Suci Amita Dewi overcalled I♠. When that came back to Chan she

doubled and Charmian Koo took her seriously, cuebidding 2\(\Delta \) on the assumption that there had to be a safe parking spot in three of a minor and showing her near-maximum pass in case Chan was strong. There is no question in my mind that Chan should have passed out I. The South hand is a flat 12-count and there is zero possibility that partner has a penalty pass of Ind doubled, so why on earth give the opposition another chance - they could still have a much better and more lucrative spot than I ♠ available to them. Having said which, we have all made bad bids without suffering quite so much blood loss as did Chan on this board. In her wildest dreams, Kristina Murniati could not have imagined that she would get to defend 34 doubled with that club holding.

Dewi led the king of spades, ducked, and promptly switched to the eight of diamonds to the ten and queen. Back came a spade, Chan winning the ace and leading the jack of hearts. Dewi won that with the king and cashed the queen of spades, on which Murniati ditched her remaining diamond. Dewi continued with the seven of diamonds and things got even worse for declarer when she put up the ace and saw it ruffed. Murniati played the king of clubs, Chan winning the ace and leading a diamond. Dewi won the king and away went a heart from the East hand. Ace of hearts and a heart ruff was followed by the queen them ten of clubs to pin the nine, and Murniati had the last trick with the eight of clubs. The contract made just three tricks so was down six for -1400 and 15 IMPs to Pertamina, ahead by 76-69.


The natural I♠ opening saw a natural INT overcall and Murniati made a quiet raise to 2♠, ending the auction as Chan had no way to show a weak minor two-suiter in this auction.

Koo led out three rounds of spades to prevent ruffs in the dummy, and understandable defence, but it did depend on South holding some help in hearts. On the actual layout this defence merely made life simple for declarer. Dewi won the third spade, drew the missing trump and continued with the queen of hearts, ducking when Koo covered with the king. Koo played ace and another diamond but Dewi won the king and could cash the hearts, coming to nine tricks for +140.

Bojoh had no reason to bid over a strong club opening on her right but Tueje could overcall INT as South to show both minors. Zhu showed her spades, Bojoh competed gently in clubs, and Liu jumped to 4\(\Delta\) on the strength of her three trumps, ace and singleton. She was not to know that her partner held a bad strong no trump rather than a crisper and more shapely hand with a sixth spade. Bojoh did not have too much difficulty in finding a double to end the auction.

Bojoh led the queen of clubs, seeing no hurry to draw trumps. Zhu won the ace and ruffed her low club then led a spade to the queen and king. Back came the jack of clubs to her king. She played the ten of spades and Bojoh, with no great desire to be on lead, ducked. Zhu led a heart to the jack by a diamond to her king, only to followed discover that Tueje really didn't have much for her INT overcall. Bojoh won the diamond and played a diamond back to her partner's queen. Dewi ruffed the next diamond and was down to ♠|8 ♥Q2 facing the remaining hearts. It seems that she should make two more tricks whichever suit she plays from hand, coming to eight in all, but she is credited with only seven and that is what we must go with (perhaps the operator played the wrong minor-suit ten at trick eight and actually a club was ruffed and over-ruffed, North cashed the A and exited with the diamond?); down three for -800 and 14 IMPs to Pertamina, whose lead grew to 90-70 with 10 boards to play.


The score had moved on only slightly to 91-70 at the midpoint in the set, then it got much closer again.



We do not have a record from the other room, but the result was 3NT-I by North for -50. It looked as though that could well be repeated here when Murniati led the six of spades, but the lead gave Dewi a problem. The Rule of II tells West that, if the lead is from strength, declarer has one card higher. If that card is the queen, then West must play low at trick one, while if it is a lower card she must put in the jack. Well, the fact that North has more high-card strength than East improves the chance that the spade card is the queen, but against that there are three non-queens to consider. How would West feel if she played low and declarer scooped in the seven or eight?

Dewi played the jack of spades. Koo won the queen and led a diamond to the jack followed by a heart to the jack and a second diamond to the king. Next she played a club to the king and ace and Murniati returned the seven of spades. After a little thought, Koo called for the nine and when that forced the ace she had nine tricks for +400 and 10 IMPs; 80-91.

West had a genuine problem. The only way to avoid this would be for East to treat the ten as a small card and lead a second-best eight, when playing the jack could never be the right choice.




The respective Norths opened their minor of choice and the respective Souths showed spades in the manner required by their agreements. Both Norths jumped to 2NT and were raised to game.

Despite the I popening on her right, Liu chose the two of clubs for her opening lead. That went to the eight, ten and queen and she had ensured four club tricks for declarer without any guesswork being required. Bojoh duly played back the jack of clubs to the king and ace then cashed the nine to take away Liu's safe exit card in the suit before leading a diamond to her jack. That lost to the queen and Liu returned the five of hearts to the eight and queen. Zhu switched to a diamond, Bojoh winning the ace and cashing the five of clubs, both defenders pitching diamonds, then the king of diamonds, Liu throwing a heart. Bojoh cashed the ace and king of spades and must have suspected that it was right to finesse the eight now but she had nine tricks by playing to the queen so that is what she did; +600.

Murniati led the five of hearts to the eight and jack. Dewi switched to the three of diamonds so Koo won the ace and led the queen of clubs. That held the trick and she continued with a low club to the eight and ten. Back came the nine of spades. Koo won the ace and played a club to the king and ace followed by a diamond to the jack. That lost and back came the seven of hearts. Koo put in the nine and was one down for -100 and 12 IMPs to

Pertamina, whose lead grew again to 103-80 with six boards to play.

Do you ever think back fondly to the good old days when East could have made a strong jump shift of 2\(\Delta\) then repeated the suit and there would have been no doubt about what was going on? As it was, it was one big mess at both tables.

Murniati responded I then used FSF before repeating her spades. I'm not convinced that she had done enough to set spades as trumps and can understand why her raise to 4NT was taken as natural and invitational. Still, Dewi must have been close to bidding on as she did have a spare queen or so for her bidding to date.

Four No Trump is not secure on the E/W cards. If Koo had led a diamond Dewi would have had to cover South's continuation of the ten to block the suit and would have been relieved to find that there was indeed a blockage. In practice, Koo led a club so Dewi had 13 top tricks for +520.


Liu also responded I♠ then used FSF. She bid the spades again the, not at all sure that a raise to 4NT

would be keycard, groped with a 4- cuebid. However, when she next bid 4NT, that would seem to have been taken as keycard for clubs. Murniati could see that her partner had not responded for spades but was not yet willing to give up on the grand slam so tried 5NT and, whatever she thought 6- meant, it was enough to persuade her to bid 7-.

At my local club, the little old ladies (and little old gentlemen) would bang down the ace of diamonds with a large smirk and down would go the contract, but at international level there is an assumption that the opposition know what they are doing, so Tueje imagined that declarer had a diamond void. She therefore led a trump and Liu had her grand; +1510 and 14 IMPs to Sapphire. They trailed by 9 IMPs with four boards to play.

Board 13 was flat in game down two by N/S, but Sapphire gained 3 overtrick IMPs on Board 14 so closed to 6 IMPs, 97-103 with two boards left.

Bojoh overcalled I♠ and Tueje showed a constructive spade raise then, when Bojoh invited game, accepted the invitation. Liu led the eight of clubs to the five and king, ducked by Bojoh. Zhu switched to a low heart — had she not done so declarer's heart loser could have gone away on the king of diamonds — and Bojoh put up the queen. She led the ten of diamonds, Liu winning the ace and playing a club to the jack and ace. A club ruff was followed by the ♦K to get rid of the last club, and

now the spade finesse led to 11 tricks for +650.

To take the match to the final board, Chan/Koo needed to match that result by bidding and making game. Dewi opened a weak no trump and Koo overcalled. Chan did all that could be expected of her by inviting game, and perhaps Koo might have gone on. It was not a clearcut decision, but her hand could have been worse for the initial overcall. Once Koo passed out 34, the number of tricks made scarcely mattered in the grand scheme of things. Murniati led the jack of hearts, ducked to the king, and Dewi switched to a trump, run to dummy's ten. Koo crossed to the queen of hearts and led the nine of clubs from hand, Murniati winning the ten and cashing the ace of diamonds then playing a heart to dummy's ace. A club to the ace followed by a club ruff with the queen put declarer back in dummy to take the spade finesse and Koo had 10 tricks for +170 but 10 IMPs to Pertamina, who led by 16 IMPs with just one board to play.

Sapphire picked up an IMP on the last deal to give a final score of 113-98 in favour of Pertamina DKI. Congratulations to Lusje Bojoh, Juilita Tueje, Kristina Murniati, Suci Amita Dewi, Conny Sumampouw and Rury Andhani.

Open Final I - Nanguang Power v Sichuan Panzhihua BA

So the final of the 2016 Hong Inter-city Open Team Championships would be between two Chinese teams, both of whom had come through the previous day's semi-finals more easily than they might have expected. The final would be played over three 16-board sessions.



Both Easts opened I , much to the surprise of the two South players, who passed to see what would happen. When Shenghong Chen, for Nanguang, rebid 2 , Sichuan's Zhong Qiao Huang doubled for penalties and Jiaxiang Shen ran to the hoped for safety of his seven-card heart suit, ending the auction.


Shen ruffed the spade lead and played a club, Han Qin Liu rising with the king to lead a heart through. Shen rose with the ace and crossruffed for a while but then had to play on diamonds and Huang could cash his red winners then play a winning spade, forcing Shen to ruff and concede the last trick to the ace of diamonds for down one and -50.

For Nanguang, Xin Li doubled the opening bid despite his own suit also being spades. Rui Wang responded with a quiet 24 and Li went on with 2NT, which Wang raised to game.

Shaolin He led his fourth-best heart, Bao Dong Xie winning the ace and returning the ten. Xin Li won

the second heart, cashed the ♣A, and then tried the ♠A, just in case something interesting happened – it did, as He showed out. Li switched his attention back to clubs, leading low and, when the nine appeared on his left, went into a long study before eventually calling for dummy's ten. Both defenders pitched a diamond on the run of the clubs so Li came to 12 tricks for +490 and 10 IMPs to Nanguang, a perfect start to the match for them.

Huang raised to 20 while Li did not, but the swing was created by the respective East's decision wther or not to try for game facing a simple raise. Perhaps the fact that He had failed to raise hearts via a 20 unassuming cuebid, while Shen had not had that option open to him made a difference?


Huang led the two of diamonds against 2° , to the eight, nine, and Chen winning the bare ace and leading a heart to the ten and ace. He Chen ruffed the diamond return and played a spade to the king then cashed the queen of hearts, discovering the four-one break, then switched back to spades, the jack losing to the ace. Huang returned the nine of hearts to declarer's king and Chen cashed the queen of spades then played the thirteenth spade, ruffed by Huang. Liu had come down to a doubleton club by now so Chen had the rest for +170.

In the other room, a diamond was again led, this time to the jack, queen and ace. Xie played the king

of hearts to the ace, Wang returning the two of spades to his partner's ace. A diamond went to the eight, nine and ruff, and Xie led a heart to the ten, cashed the ∇Q and played out the winning spades. Li ruffed the fourth spade and played a diamond. Xie ruffed but, as Wang had kept three clubs, had to lose a trick to the queen for down one and -100; 7 IMPs to Nanguang.

Nanguang picked up some bits and pieces to stretch the lead to 26-0 at the midpoint in the set. Then Sichuan finally came to the party.

Liu opened 2° , weak with both majors, and Chen made a scary 3° overcall on what was basically a weak no trump with a poor five-card suit. Shen duly converted to 3NT and Huang doubled because he had the diamonds sewn up.

Liu led the jack of hearts, Shen winning dummy's queen and cashing out the clubs then exiting with a diamond. Huang won and played a spade through, Shen rising with the ace and exiting with the queen to Liu's king. But Liu had kept his second diamond with which to get off play so there was no endplay and the defence had the rest for down one and — 200.

There was no opening bid from North at the other table so Xie got to open $I \diamondsuit$ as East. Wang, however, overcalled $I \spadesuit$ at his next turn and Li made a simple spade raise, He ending the auction with a jump to 3NT.

Nobody had mentioned clubs so, in search of a safe lead, that was what Wang chose. He won the ace and took an immediate spade finesse, losing to the king. Now Wang was in a position to defeat the contract, but the winning defence required that he play Li for $\triangle AK10$. The alternative was to play him for $\triangle Kx$ by leading a low heart, and that is what Wang chose. He scooped in the king of hearts and had nine tricks for +600 and 13 IMPs to Sichuan, who trailed by 13-26.

Part of that gain went right back on the next deal when Liu/Huang bid a very optimistic 3NT and were down two for -200 while teammates were also going down in a partscore for -100 at the other table to present Nanguang with 7 IMPs; 33-13. The teams exchanged minor swings then came another big one.

Chen and Shen bid to 3NT after a $I \circ$ opening from Chen. Huang led the three of diamonds to the eight, king and queen, and Liu switched to the king of spades, Chen winning his ace and leading a club to the ten. When that held the trick he continued with a heart to the queen and king then ace and another club. The fourth club was cashed, throwing a heart from hand, then a heart led to North's ace. Liu tried a low spade now but declarer had no losing option on this trick. Winning it Chen cashed two hearts then two diamonds, coming to II tricks for +460.

Xie opened INT in the other room and reached 3NT via a Stayman auction. When Wang now doubled, knowing that he had strong spades over dummy's presumed four-card suit, Xie ran from what was an unbeatable contract into the hoped for security of his five-card suit, Li finding an aggressive double on the South cards. Four Hearts too is unbeatable, double dummy, but we don't live in a double dummy world and things did not go well for Xie.

Li led the seven of spades to the queen and Xie ducked. Wang continued with the king of spades to declarer's ace and Xie played the king of hearts from hand, presumably assuming that Li's doubled was based on good hearts so that there would be no point in leading towards his holding. Wang won the ♥A and returned the two of spades for Li to ruff and the diamond return was ducked to the king. Xie ruffed the fourth spade low so was over-ruffed and back came a diamond. Xie won and played a trump but was three down for −500 and 14 IMPs to Nanguang, who led by 50-14.

Shen opened 2. Precision, and Chen responded 2. constructive but not forcing. That ended the auction and Li led ace of hearts followed by ace and a low diamond. Chen put up dummy's king and cashed the hearts for a diamond pitch from the dummy then led a spade to the nine and ten. If he was not going to ruff a diamond in dummy, what was the point of cashing the hearts to discard dummy's diamond? Liu cashed the ace of spades then played the jack of diamonds and was left on play when Huang could have overtaken and played

the thirteenth diamond, on which Liu could have discarded a club. That would have netted a fourth trump trick for Liu but, as it was, he had only the ΦO to come for down one and -100.

He opened a natural $I \clubsuit$ in the other room so Wang could overcall $I \spadesuit$. His subsequent heart support was really an overbid with such a minimum overcall and only three low hearts and it tempted Li to bid 4% over the doomed opposing 3NT. Li was doubled, of course, ending the auction.

He led the king of spades so Li won the ace and cashed the queen for a club discard. Next he ran the jack of diamonds, losing to the king, and He returned the queen of clubs. Xie took the ace and returned the jack of spades, on which Li pitched his remaining club, and a fourth spade was ruffed and over-ruffed. He returned the ♣K and declarer ruffed, cashed the ace of hearts and played winning diamonds. Xie had two trump tricks to come for down three and −500. Sichuan Panzhihua gained 12 IMPs but Nanguang Power led at the end of the first session by 50-26 IMPs.

Nanguang Power led by 50-26 IMPs going into the second of three 16-board sets of the 2016 Hong Kong Inter-city Open Team final. Nanguan added to their lead early in set two.

The two auctions were identical up to South's second bid. Now Huang showed extras by bidding 3♣ but, with a seventh club and 15 HCP, this didn't quite get the job done and, looking at a potential misfit, Liu called it a day. After a spade lead, Huang lost a spade and a club, scoring +150.

Li's second bid of 3NT better reflected the potential of his hand, though concealing his great club length should 5♣ have been a better spot. He ducked the spade lead, won the continuation and ran the diamonds. When he next led dummy's club and the king appeared he took the ace and queen of clubs and $\heartsuit A$ and had nine tricks for +600 and 10 IMPs to Nanguang; 60-26.

Sichuan recovered 3 IMPs for an extra undertrick on Board 19 to close to 29-60, but then the cards ran quietly for a while with three flat boards. Then the action started up once more.

He passed the West II-count then bid only INT over Li's I♠ overcall and N/S were allowed to play cheaply in 24. He led the seven of hearts to the eight, nine and ace, and Li led a diamond up, misguessing by putting in the ten when He ducked smoothly. Xie won the Q and returned a low club to the eight and ace and He led a second heart to dummy's king. Li tested the diamond position by leading the king off the dummy and, when Xie played low without hesitation, judged correctly that the ace was on his left. He ruffed the diamond,

ruffed a club, ruffed a second diamond and ruffed a second club. When he next played another diamond off the table, Xie ruffed in front of him with the ace but Li had two spade tricks to come so the contract was just made for +110.

Xinli opened the West hand, after which it was routine to get to game. Liu led a spade against 3NT, Xinli winning dummy's bare ace and crossing to hand with the ace of diamonds then leading a second diamond to the queen. Far from being the three-three split he had hoped for, all that achieved was to establish three diamond winners for North. Xinli simply cashed out for down two, seeing the hopelessness of trying to make his contract. Minus 200 meant 3 IMPs to Sichuan; 32-60.

Board 24 was a normal partscore which happened to make game, flat at +170, but then...

When Xie opened $I\heartsuit$, Li made a simple overcall and that allowed He an easy negative double. Xie gave full weight to his six-five shape by jumping over Wang's simple club raise and when Li went on to 54, leaving no room for further investigation, He guessed to bid the diamond slam.



Li led ace and another club. Xie ruffed, crossed to the ace of spades and led the jack of diamonds. When there was no flicker on his right he went up with the ace so was down two for -200. this was a good play, as Xie could see that 50 was the most likely contract in the other room. As his slam was doomed, he wanted to play diamonds differently to

the other declarer and, had the king been bare offside, he might have escaped with a flat board.

Huang made a pre-emptive overcall of 4♣, which was too high for Xinli to make a negative double. He therefore passed and raised Xiao's 4♦ rebid to game. When that came around to Huang, he doubled and led the jack of spades. That enabled Xiao to get rid of his club loser, taking the pressure off his declarer play. He took the top spades then led a heart to the queen and ace, ruffed the club return and cashed the ace of diamonds before playing on hearts. Xiao cashed the ♥Q then crossruffed the rest of the tricks for +750 and 14 IMPs to Nanguang; 74-32.

Board 27. Dealer South. None Vul.



He's 2NT opening ended the auction and Wang led his fourth-best diamond round to declarer's ten. He led the king then queen of clubs, Wang winning the second round (Li pitching the ♠J) and getting off play with a third club. He won the jack and played back the king of diamonds, ducked, then cashed the clubs, coming down to two cards in each suit. Next he exited by playing a diamond. Wang won two of those but was then endplayed into conceding the eighth trick for +120.

Xinli opened I♣, strong, and Xiao responded with a I♦ negative. Huang's double showed the majors and Xinli redoubled, allowing Liu to leave it around to his partner to pick a major. Huang did so and Liu

competed with 2° over Xinli's INT. Xinli was still unwilling to let his opponents buy the contract so doubled in search of a minor-suit fit and found one. Looking at 18 HCP, sitting over the strong balanced hand, Liu penalty doubled $3\clubsuit$, ending the auction.

Liu led a low club to the ten and queen, ducked Xinli's play of the queen of diamonds, but won the next play of the jack of clubs with the ace and exited with his last club. That was won on dummy to lead a diamond to the nine, losing to the jack. Liu played ace and the fourth diamond and away went dummy's heart loser. However there was no way to avoid two spade loers so the contract was down one for -100 and 6 IMPs to sichuan; 39-74.


Wang did not overcall with the jack-high heart suit but was happy to show support when Huang overcalled 2Φ . However, both North and South had done their bidding now and, both having some defensive potential, there was no strong temptation to go on to 5Φ over 4Φ .

Huang cashed the ace of diamonds against $4\clubsuit$ then switched to a heart to the nine and king. Xiao led a spade to the jack and when that lost to the queen Liu wasted no time in playing king and another diamond to give his partner a ruff. Huang knew that the contract was already defeated so he could afford to underlead the club to also get a heart ruff and that meant down three for -150.

Wang did overcall $I \heartsuit$ at the other table and when

he next raised clubs Li went on to 5♣ with some hope of making. However, Xie doubled and there were two tricks to be lost in each major for -500 and 12 IMPs to Sichuan; 51-74.

He and Xie had a smooth auction to the small slam with Xie bidding and rebidding the hearts then showing spade support, a diamond control, and one key card. Knowing that there was a missing key card, He settled for the small slam and was rewarded when the trump king was offside; +1430.

Xinli/Xiao started the same way but Xiao showed his spade support via a club splinter. After an exchange of cuebids, Xinli asked for key cards and found his partner with one. The only explanation for the subsequent bidding that I can think of is that He had taken 4♣ as natural and only when Xie converted to 6♠ did he realise what was going on. Now he guessed to bid Seven and guessed wrong. One down meant −100 and 17 IMPs to Sichuan. The match was getting very close now at 68-74.

Nanguang picked up an overtrick IMP on Board 30, Board 31 was flat in 3NT-1, and Board 32 saw the N/Ss each score +110 though in different partscores.

That left it nicely poised at 75-68 in favour of Nanguang with 16 boards to play.



Open Final 3 – Nanguang Power v Sichuan Panzhihua BA

A late surge in set two had seen Sichuan come from over 40 IMPs behind to trail by only 68-75 going into this third and last session of the Hong Kong Inter-city Open Team Championship final 2016. Sixteen deals remaining, and there was all to play for.

Not for the first time, Nanguang made a fast start to a new set.

Xie started with his longest suit then, with nothing in the opposition's suit, treated his powerful heart doubleton a she would have done any three-card holding and raised to $3\heartsuit$. He had no reason to do other than go on to $4\heartsuit$ now that a fit appeared to have been established.

Xiao led the jack of spades against 4♥, Xinli ducking to declarer's king. He led the nine of diamonds towards dummy's king with the desired effect of pressuring Xiao into rising with the ace in fear of declarer having a singleton. He won the club return with the ace and led a diamond to his queen then a heart to the king and took a club pitch on the king of diamonds. A spade up saw Xinli win the ace and return the jack of diamonds, He ruffing with the ten and Xiao pitching a club. He ruffed his low spade and away went Xiao's last club so that, when He tried to get back to hand with a club ruff, he was over-ruffed and still had a second trump to lose for down one and −50.

Double dummy, declarer could have succeeded had he ruffed a club low after pitching the ΦQ on the $\Diamond K$. He could then have played the ΦQ from hand to keep


North off lead and would have been able to ruff a spade with the $\heartsuit A$. That line is only correct, however, because the hearts are five-one.

In the other room, Chen opened $I \diamondsuit$ and could show the clubs at his next turn, after which it was normal for Shen to try 3NT.

Three No Trump is awkward both to play and defend. Liu led the jack of spades, ducked to declarer's king, and Shen cashed the ace and king of hearts, squeezing Huang, who eventually pitched a diamond. Shen continued with a diamond to the queen and ace and Liu returned the jack of clubs, ducked to South's king. Huang cashed the ace of spades then played a third spade to clear the suit but Shen could win, cash the hearts and, after cashing the ♣Q, cross to the ♦K and claim 10 tricks for +430 and 10 IMPs to Nanguang; 85-68.

Nanguang added medium-sized swings on the next two deals and Board 4 was a flat 3NT+1, leaving the score at 95-68 in their favour with 12 boards to play.


Xie/He had a simple invitational sequence to 3NT, against which Xinli led the ace of hearts and, seeing jack to three in dummy, continued with the eight of hearts to declarer's now bare king. Had dummy held jack-doubleton and declarer king to three, he would have known to continue with the queen – the benefit of starting with the ace. Xie was helpless. He led a club to the king and ace and back came a heart. The contract was down two for -100.

Chen opened a strong $I \clubsuit$ and declared $3 \clubsuit$, against which Huang led the nine of clubs round to his ten. Chen played a club back to the king and ace and Liu

led a heart, Huang winning the queen and playing ace and a third round to dummy's jack. Chen ran the eight of clubs then crossed to hand with a top diamond to draw the last trump and had nine tricks for +110 and 5 IMPs to Nanguang; 100-68.

Just when prospects were beginning to look bleak for Sichuan, they scored their first points of the set.



Chen's Precision 2♣ opening shut out Huang but Liu had enough to make a balancing overcall and Huang raised to 4♠. The defenders cashed their top tricks without putting declarer to a heart guess so the contract was two down for -100.

Xie's natural I♣ opening gave Xinli an opportunity to overcall I♠ and that added momentum to the auction. As the cards lie, 5♣ is a simple make so Xiao improved his result a little by saving and getting out for down three on the same defence as in the other room. However, -500 meant 9 IMPs to Sichuan, closing to 77-100 with 10 boards to go.


A couple of flat boards followed but Board 9 was anything but flat.



Xiao could open 2♠ to show a weak hand with spades and a minor – a perfect example of the bid and of its effectiveness, and that enabled Xinli to jump to 4♥ over Xie's overcall. Unless he was willing to commit to hearts with king-doubleton, all He could do was to double. Xie knew that was high cards rather than spades, of course, but he had two queen-high sidesuits plus a spade loser, and was not at all sure that he could make a five-level contract, so passed and settled for whatever penalty would come his way. The penalty was –300, just losing the five obvious tricks – not bad with the opposition cold for a vulnerable slam in either of two suits.

Liu did not have the two-suited bid at his disposal so passed, though I can think of several players who would have opened 2♠ anyway, even if by doing so they showed only spades. By the time that N/S had got together in spades it was too late, as their opponents had already established that they had a diamond fit. Shen passed over 4♠ and raised to slam at his next turn, trusting that Chen would have doubled 4♠ if holding two losers in the suit. Six Diamonds lost a spade but that was all; +1370 and 14 IMPs to Nanguang, and the lead was back up to 114-77 with seven boards to play.

Board 10 was a flat game, just making on the N/S cards.




Xiao made the normal $4\frac{1}{2}$ pre-empt and He bid 4° when that came back to him, Xie giving preference to $4\frac{1}{2}$ to end the auction. Had He instead doubled $4\frac{1}{2}$, could Xier have found the pass, collecting +500 on accurate defence via a trump promotion? No matter, He had to try to make $4\frac{1}{2}$.

Xiao led the king of clubs to dummy's ace and He led a spade to the jack then a low heart round to Xinli's ten. Xinli returned the ten of spades so He won the king and played ace of hearts and ruffed a heart. He ruffed a club back to hand then exited with a heart. Xinli cashed the fifth heart then played a diamond through to the king and that was one down for -50.

I suspect the BBO record to be in error there as declarer appears to have played to go off whoever has the king of diamonds. The same line but cashing the ♣A before exiting with the heart makes the contract if South holds the ⋄K as he will have to lead away from it after taking his heart winners. Declarer could, of course, have made his contract as the cards lie by playing ace and another diamond before taking the heart ruff in the dummy, as the ⋄Q would have provided a discard for one of the heart losers.

Liu only overcalled 3 and then saw his opponents bid up to 4 with declarer showing his two-suiter along the way. Huang doubled the final contract and perhaps it was that which tempted Liu into making the hyperaggressive lead of the king of diamonds rather than the normal K. Whatever his reasoning, Liu's lead was a big help to Shen.

Declarer won the ace of diamonds and ducked a heart. Back came a club to the jack and ace and he took the spade finesse then tried to cash the ace of hearts. That was ruffed but Liu had nothing useful to lead. He chose his remaining diamond to dummy's queen. Shen crossruffed the red suits for a while and concede a heart at the end; 10 tricks for +590 an 12 IMPs to Nanguang, up now by 126-77.



Looking at a minimum opening, Shen passed over Huang's take-out double but then competed to 3\(\Delta\) when Chen could rebid the suit independently. Three Spades ended the auction.

Huang led the king of hearts, ducked, then switched to the king of clubs and back to the queen of hearts to dummy's ace. Chen led a diamond to the jack then the ΦQ , rising with the ace when Huang unconcernedly played low. A second spade lost to the king and Huang cashed the jack of hearts but the $\nabla 10$ took care of declarer's small diamond and Chen was home with nine tricks for +140.

He redoubled to show three-card spade support and that permitted Xie to jump to 44, putting the pressure on his opponents. Xinli knew there was a big club fit and saved in 54, doubled by He.

Xie led the queen of spades to the king and ace so the defence had no difficulty in cashing its four winners for down two, -500 and 8 IMPs to Sichuan. That brought them a little closer at 85-126 but, with only four boards remaining, it was too little too late.

Nanguang Power of China were the 2016 Hong Kong Open Inter-city Team champions. Congratulations to Shenghong Chen, Jiaxiang Shen, Shi Xiao, Xin Li, Xinli Gan and Rui Wang, who beat Sichuan Panzhihua by 127-87 IMPs in the final.


